#### VILLAGE OF INDIANTOWN TO RE-OPEN PARKS ON LABOR DAY

Youth and adult leagues can begin scheduling play

**Indiantown, FL** – The Village of Indiantown will re-open its three municipal parks to the public on Monday, September 7, 2020. The Village will begin accepting league play schedule requests the day after the Labor Day holiday. Parks have been closed since March due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We are being very cautious about re-opening," said Village Manager Howard W. Brown Jr. "The Village Council and administration will still require face masks to prevent the spread of COVID-19, but the parks, playgrounds, fields and courts will be opened."

The Village operates three parks, Booker Park, 15101 SW 169<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Post Family Park, 15700 SW Warfield Boulevard and Big Mound Park, 15205 SW Indian Mound Drive. The parks will be open from sunrise to sunset, with the lighted tennis courts, basketball courts and recreational fields open until 10 p.m.

"I've already had some of the youth and adult leagues contact me about schedules," said Village Parks and Recreations Director Albie Scoggins. "They're ready to get back to playing."

# Central Florida Central Florida Regional Housing Trust Offers Cash for Census in Orlando

The Central Florida Regional Housing Trust, an arm of the Central Florida Foundation, has worked hard to encourage 2020 Census participation in some of the hard-to-count areas in Orlando. With the deadline fast approaching, leaders are stepping up their efforts. The Trust recently announced that any resident in the historically hard-to-count neighborhoods of Parramore or West Lakes who completes their census online and submits a copy of their confirmation email will be entered into a weekly drawing for a \$100 Visa gift card. There will also be a grand-prize drawing for a \$500 gift card on Oct. 1, one day after the scheduled deadline for 2020 Census self-response. As of Aug. 28, Parramore had a response rate of 31.3 percent and West Lakes had a response of 45.1 percent.

#### **UnidosNow Elevates Census Outreach in Sarasota and Manatee**

UnidosNow Executive Director Luz Corcuera is a member of both the Sarasota and Manatee County Complete Count Committees. The mission of Corcuera and her organization is to elevate the quality of life of the Latino Community through education, integration, and civic engagement. UnidosNow continues its outreach and support of the 2020 Census on its social media channels.

"Our conversations in the Latinx community frequently revolve around the sense of being invisible, not having representation in leadership positions, and not having a voice that is heard by those in power," Corcuera <u>said recently</u>. "We all agree that we need to start early on preparing for the work ahead, building a new generation of leaders who will aim for social, civic, and political integration."

"I believe that the U.S. Census is giving us a great opportunity to be visible, to add our voices to discussions of political and social issues, and to have input on the resources that can be brought to our community. Being counted during the census will help more accurately reflect the diversity and true makeup of our community."

#### Pan de Vida Distributes Food and Census Info in Kissimmee

Advance Senior Center and "Pan de Vida" Church in Kissimmee held a community food distribution recently led by Pastor Norberto Fonseca and other community leaders. Along with the food, census promotional items were handed out and residents reminded of the importance of participating on the 2020 Census. Census staff was also on hand to answer questions and to help attendees complete their 2020 Census questionnaires on-site.

#### Desoto "Parks It" for 2020 Census

Desoto County's All Faiths Food Bank staff, led by Site Manager, Heather Ferjuste, is helping with 2020 Census outreach in the community. In addition to handing out Census Fact sheets and promotional items to those in need of services, staff encourage visitors to fill out the census questionnaire on-site from their cars. As clients drive up for food boxes, the staff asks if they have filled out the questionnaire, and if not, they are asked to park and fill it out online or by phone before leaving the parking lot. During a recent event, they succeeded in getting 10 families to fill out the guestionnaire and they hope to see those numbers jump in the coming weeks.

#### South Florida **Broward County Reaches Out**

Recently, 2020 Census outreach was held in a hard-to-enumerate area near the Broward Municipal Services District (BMSD). At the Broward County Transit Central Bus Terminal, transit staff distributed masks, while Planning & Management Development Division staff greeted passengers, encouraged them to complete the Census, and gave out 2020 Census backpacks to over 120 people.

#### Promoting 2020 Census in Portuguese and Spanish

Fort Lauderdale real estate agent Mara Pacheco takes to YouTube to encourage the local Brazilian and Hispanic communities of South Florida to respond to the 2020 Census. In her YouTube video she emphasizes the importance of the large immigrant population in South Florida being counted.

#### Lehigh Acres, School Board Member Aggressively **Boost Census Count**

With a tremendous effort from Lee School Board Member Gwyn Gittens and the Lehigh Acres Complete Count Committee (CCC), the area has already exceeded their 2010 census response rates for all their designated tracts. Not only have they seen an increase, they are growing the response rate by a 10 percent overall tract average, with some tracts seeing gains over 20 percent. The Lehigh Acres CCC is a group of grassroots community members and organizations that care about the future of their community. Lehigh Acres is the fastest-growing part of Lee County and they believe that increased federal funding can make a difference in their future.

#### Lake Worth Beach Delivers Produce and Census Messages

The city of Lake Worth Beach and Arms of Hope, a non-profit organization that helps to feed the hungry, recently started delivering produce boxes to residents. Census response representatives were on site to provide information and encourage residents to be counted in the 2020 Census. The produce boxes came with a flyer and a sticker encouraging people to respond to the 2020 Census. More than 5,000 boxes will be provided over the next few weeks in one of the hardest to count population centers in Palm Beach County.

#### Broward Employers Give Employees Time to Complete Census

The Broward County Office of Economic and Small Business Development partnered with the Greater Fort Lauderdale Alliance, the Broward Workshop, CareerSource, Memorial Healthcare System, municipal chambers of commerce and local employers, large and small, in the Show Your Love For Broward - Census Workforce Campaign, which began August 10. The purpose of the campaign is to encourage employees, with the support of their employers, to carve out 10-15 minutes at work this month to complete the Census. The campaign was extended to run through the end of the 2020 Census.





This letter is to confirm funding commitments made by the Department of Environmental Protection's, Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) Programs collectively referred to as the "Department", to the Village of Indiantown (the "Village") for drinking water and wastewater system acquisition.
